Faith Speaks

Christmas invites us to have a child-like wonder at the birth of baby Jesus in a manger. Christmas also invites us to feel the warmth of family as we remember that the Father has given us his Son so that we might be children of God. And, of course, all of these feelings pour over into our homes and our lives as we gather with each other, decorate trees, exchange gifts, and celebrate traditions.

Christmas certainly does bring out all of the "feels," doesn't it? But, if we stop and ponder these things (like Mary did - Luke 2:19), we might find ourselves facing a truly massive theological question - how can Jesus both God That is a question man? that sparked the interest of the early church for over 400 years and was at the center of several major church councils.

It is mind-boggling if you think about it. In fact, those of you with children have probably heard this question in some form. On the surface, the incarnation seems to be a contradiction. God is infinite, all-powerful, eternal, and all-knowing. Mankind, on the other hand, has none of those attributes. This apparent contradiction actually led to one of the first heresies in the early church - Docetism. The Docetist said that Jesus must have only SEEMED to have a natural fleshly body because there is no way that God would actually stoop so low as to enflesh himself.

But, beloved, God did stoop

that low! That is what Immanuel means - "God WITH us," and more "God BEthan that, CAME us." So, how do we reconcile this? How can Jesus be both fully a n d fully man? When it comes to large questions like this, it's always best to just let scripture speak.

First, it's important to understand that at no point in the incarnation does the Son ever stop being God or become less divine. In John 8:58, lesus says of himself, "Before Abraham was, I am." The divine name "I Am" speaks of God's eternal nature. So, after Jesus has been enfleshed (made man), he is still saying of himself that he has always been and always will be God.

But it's equally important to understand that after his incarnation, Jesus never stopped being man, either. John 1:14 - "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." The fact that Jesus became flesh means he adopted all of the weaknesses and vulnerabilities that we have in our flesh. He thirsted (John 19:28), he bled (John 19:33 cried (Luke he 19:41), and he died (Mark 15:37). And after his resurrection, Jesus was still both $G \circ d$ man. Thomas put his fingers into Jesus' wounded flesh and exclaimed, "My Lord and my God!" (John 20:28). Nothing about lesus' humanity has changed since then, even after his ascension into heaven. When Paul is writing Timothy, he says, "There IS one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the MAN Christ lesus" (1 Tim. 2:5).

But, perhaps the best way to understand the dual natures of Christ is to understand WHY Jesus must be fully God and fully man. Jesus took on flesh so that he could identify with our struggles and be the perfect sacrifice for sins. "Therefore he had to be made like his brothers in every respect, so that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make propitiation for the sins o f the ple" (Hebrews 2:17).

Christmas is always such a busy time. In the panic of the season, let's remember to pause, reflect, and ponder in our hearts and minds the great thing that God has He has not just done. come to us; he has become like us. Praise our Lord and Savior, the God -Man, Jesus Christ! Merry Christmas.


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From the Pastor's Shelf...

"The Christological Controversy" - Richard A. Norris


The Session made plans to set the 2024 budget meeting during the first two weeks in January.



UPDATE FROM JENNY COON

Firmly Rooted: Living in Lebanon: November Update

Marhaba!

On Monday, a Shia Muslim from south Lebanon walked into my clinic in need of therapy due to a broken hand that was not healing correctly. He used to have a good job, but like so many people during the economic collapse he lost everything and now can not afford treatment. He was driving his taxi and his customer just happened to be an old patient of mine and she convinced him to give our clinic a try. By the end of our session, I find out that his son has a developmental disorder with multiple issues including seizures and is searching for the same medicine that we try to keep in supply for one of our pediatric patients with a similar problem. Later that day, a Sunni Sudanese woman underwent surgery for breast cancer covered by another NGO and our generous donors. We all prayed over her prior to her appointment and reminded her she was not alone, even though she often felt alone as she walked through this scary road of cancer in a foreign country, a husband who left her, and kids far away. I then had a young, Orthodox Syrian mom referred to me by our psychologist who was struggling with near daily panic attacks due to the fear of death/dying and so many triggers all around her as she struggled to care for her 3 children under the age of 6 by herself. I could have just given some exercises for the man with the fractured wrist, wrote a check for the lady with breast cancer, and sent the mom with panic attacks back to the psychiatrist for a

medicine refill. Because that day, our clinic saw a record number of patients and frankly was over-whelmed. But that's not why our clinic is here. Because the man with the fractured hand saw that we saw him as more than just another number, but looked towards the needs of his family as well, it opened up a conversation about faith and why I was here. The woman with breast cancer was able to see what it meant to weep with those who weep when we prayed together. And I was able to share with this young mom about the body, mind, and soul how they all interconnect.

I am so grateful that our little clinic, born out of the disaster of the port explosion 3 years ago, by God's grace is still able to live up to its mission in times like these. As we continue to expand to meet the growing needs of our community, we remain dependent on our donors. Our clinic is walking by faith next year as we still have not met our budget needs. We are so grateful for your support and I think of many of you personally when patients thank us for the care they received. If you feel led to donate specifically to this ministry, the link is just below.

As I devoted last month's newsletter mostly to the conflict happening south of us, I do not have much to add to that today. However, I was invited back onto a podcast courtesy of the global ministry of Liberty Bible Church in Indiana on the topic of "War in the Middle East: What does it mean for Gospel Workers?." As always, I am so grateful for each and every one of you and how you pray, support, and encourage the ministry here in Lebanon as well as me personally.


