Faith Speaks

For as long as I've been a Christian, I have heard the narrative that Christmas is something Christians stole from the pagans. Have you heard this?! So, according to some, the early Christians were basically holiday bullies going around stealing dates and practices from the pagans so that they could steal followers from them. The big two examples of this that we hear repeated are the date of December 25th and the Christmas tree.

Now, I'm sure that most Christians, when they hear this, just roll their eyes and say, "Give me a break. I don't consider my Christmas tree a pagan symbol, so End of discussion." And honestly, that's probably the right and logical attitude to have. But, I have met Christians who have sworn off celebrating Christmas altogether because they heard it was linked to paganism.

Well, ready for some good news? There is exactly zero historical evidence that Christians ever borrowed or stole any Christmas symbols or practices from the pagans. That's right. Zero!

First, let's talk about the date of December 25th. The claim is made that ancient Roman and Pagan celebrations like Saturnalia and Sol Invictus were celebrated on December 25th, and that, of course, is where the Christians got that date. Two problems with that. First, Saturnalia was celebrated on December 17th, so that's not going to work. Now, Sol Invictus was celebrated

on December 25th later, but the earliest inscriptions we have of that holiday place it in early December. Many scholars today think that what probably happened was in the mid-200s, Emperor Aurelian moved the date of Sol Invictus to December 25th to compete with the growing Christian community. So, the exact thing Christians are accused of is what the Pagans actually did!

But where DID Christians get the date of December 25th for the birth of Christ? That date probably comes from two Christian historians from 200 to 300 AD, Africanus and Hippolytus. These guys did chronological calculations on the gospels and the book of Daniel to try and find the date of Jesus' conception and Both of them birth. landed on December 25th. Were they Honestly, we're right? not sure. But we do know that the church has been celebrating the birth of Christ on that day since at least the early 3rd century.

Alright, now come gather around the Christmas tree with me. Or should we call it the pagan tree?! No, we shouldn't. The evidence that European pagans used evergreen trees for worship and decoration is shaky at best. Most of it comes from one man, a Scottish minister named

Alexander Hyslop. Hyslop argued that Christmas traditions like trees came from European pagan roots, which came from the cult practices of ancient Babylonians. But, offers Hyslop zero sources for any of these claims.

It's much more reasonable to assume that Christians started using evergreen trees as symbolic winter decorations because that's what they saw in scripture. **Think** about how many times cedar trees are mentioned in scripture. It's a ton! Usually, cedar trees are mentioned as a sign of the goodness of God 148:9: Isaiah 55:13). God even tells his people that he wants his sanctuary to be beautified with the cypress tree (Isaiah 60:13). At some point in the 16th Century Christians in Germany began the practice of decorating their homes in the winter with cypress trees, and from there the tradition caught on. But, again, there's not a single link to anything pagan. So, no, you don't need to throw out your Christmas tree and tear down your stockings. And even if Christmas symbols did have pagan roots, I would still encourage you to (continued on page 2)



The Session discussed the new salaried position for managing Faith's social media and suggestions for posting information about Faith Church.


Prayer needs were discussed and lifted to God.



UPDATE FROM JENNY COON

Marhaba,

As we begin this week of Thanksgiving, I am acutely grateful for God's tangible and felt presence with me during some very difficult and dark times. I know that your prayers are sustaining me, and I thank you for so many of you interceding that I will never know. As we anxiously await news of talks of a cease fire, the strikes continue throughout the South and East, and here in Beirut. There are still nights I awake to my house shaking and the loud sounds of explosions, with more and more innocent lives lost and homes destroyed.

I want to share with you about two women I visited this week that we have helped at Balas-"S" is a young lady that stumbled into our clinic by accident searching for help. She had managed to rent a room down the street from us with her elderly mother and 7 year old daughter. She came in during a particularly chaotic moment and to by honest my first thought when I saw her was "I don't have time for this." I had a patient waiting for me, another in front of me discussing x-ray results, and my staff all engaged with other patients. But something in her eyes softened my busy mentality and made me stop and listen. wasn't looking for money or food, although she clearly was in need. She simply had heard on the street that we were a safe place that she could go for help that she could trust and wanted to know more. We visited her

later that week and she shared how she and her mother ran a small grocery store which helped them survive after her husband left. They were content and even in the first wave of bombings in the south, they stayed when many But finally the inevitable left. came and they were forced to flee as she described frantically grabbing her daughter, wet washcloths to hold over her mouth for the smoke, and her mother's bag of medicines before jumping into a relative's car and literally fleeing under the bombs. Her relatives were all scattered at different makeshift shelters or relatives and I couldn't escape how scared she looked. We connected her to our church and various resources promised to visit again.

"A" is a young Syrian single mother of a very outgoing 5 year old daughter. She fled the war in Syria and then a very abusive husband only to find herself fleeing another war and losing yet another house to air strikes. She came to our clinic with nothing but the clothes on her back. We gave her blankets and warm clothes for her daughter and sat and listened to her story of tragedy after tragedy. Her mother and sisters were still in refugee camps in Jordan. She also had no where to go, no where to turn, and clearly much trauma under the surface she had yet to process. We connected her to our church, and with our psychologist at Balassan.

They are the reason we continue to persevere. With each patient I treat, or patient we welcome at the clinic with a smile, or blanket we distribute, we are tangibly showing the love of Christ and

planting a seed that we pray will be harvested in the future.

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Thank you for your prayers and continued support.
